

TEXAS MARKETING AREA NEW MEXICO - WEST TEXAS MARKETING AREA

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MARKET SUMMARIES FOR OCTOBER

The October Class III price increased 53 cents from the previous month to \$12.61. The Class II price for October of \$11.85 per hundredweight increased 32 cents from \$11.53 in September. October's Class III-A price increased 76 cents from September's level to \$11.66.

Texas: Producers who delivered milk to handlers located in Zones 1 and 2 of the Texas Milk Market Order received \$13.62 per hundredweight for deliveries of milk containing 3.5% butterfat. The October price was up 36 cents from September.

Producers delivered a total of 537,738,839 pounds of milk during October. On a daily basis this represents an increase of 4.02 percent from the producer receipts level in September but it represents a decrease of 4.72 percent when compared to the producer receipts level of October 1994.

Producer milk classified as Class I during October amounted to 49.78 percent of total producer receipts. This figure is down from September's 52.46 percent but it is up slightly from 49.62 percent in October 1994. The average butterfat test of producer milk pooled during October 1995 was 3.627 percent.

New Mexico - West Texas: Producers who delivered milk to handlers located in Zone 1 of the New Mexico - West Texas Milk Market Order received \$13.03 per hundredweight for deliveries of milk containing 3.5% butterfat. The October price was up 31 cents from its September level.

Producers delivered a total of 142,493,352 pounds of milk during October. On a daily basis this represents an increase of 14.62 percent from the producer receipts level in September and it represents an increase of 23.69 percent when compared to the

producer receipts level of October 1994.

Producer milk classified as Class I during October amounted to 41.93 percent of total producer receipts. This figure is down from 49.14 percent in September and it is down from 49.63 percent in October 1994. The average butterfat test of producer milk pooled during October 1995 was 3.678 percent.

CFTC APPROVES MILK FUTURES CONTRACT

The Commodity Futures Trading Commission has approved the Coffee, Sugar & Cocoa Exchange, Inc. (CSCE) request to trade futures and options contracts for milk. CSCE expects to begin offering milk futures and options on January 23, 1996.

The new contracts, which were developed with dairy industry input, will let participants manage milk price risk by hedging with milk futures and options. Some of those who helped develop the milk contracts included NMPF member cooperative employees Paul Christ, Land O'Lakes Inc.; Curtis Kurth, Foremost Farms USA; and Jim Box, Associated Milk Producers, Inc.

The milk futures contract calls for delivery of one tankload (50,000 pounds) of Grade A raw milk with 3.5 percent butterfat at Interstate Milk Shippers' certified plants in southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois. The contracts will trade in dollars per hundredweight. The exchange will trade milk contracts daily between 9:15 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., Eastern time.

CSCE launched the first dairy futures and options contracts in 1993 with the introduction of Cheddar cheese and nonfat dry milk futures and options.

LARGE DEIP SALE SPARKS OPTIMISM

Several large awards under the Dairy Export Incentive Program (DEIP) are getting fourth quarter sales off on an optimistic note. Since the 101.8 million pounds of new three-month DEIP allocations were announced in October, USDA has accepted bids for sale of 9.7 million pounds of dairy products, nearly 10 percent of total DEIP allocations.

The largest bid accepted has been for 6.6 million pounds of nonfat dry milk to North Africa, the Middle East and Persian Gulf — the total DEIP allocation for that region. The DEIP bonus was nine cents per pound. In addition, South America exhausted its allocation for whole milk powder and cheese. South America has made two purchases of whole milk powder totaling 2.1 million pounds and has purchased 551,250 pounds of American cheese.

Asia, which exhausted DEIP allocations only days after being announced by USDA in January and July, has made two purchases of nonfat dry milk totaling 562,275 pounds.

Fourth quarter DEIP allocations were 20 percent less than the amount allocated during the third quarter. Allocations for Asia were increased 66 percent to 19 million pounds and to Mexico by 26 percent to 33.1 million pounds.

However, allocations to Algeria, a traditional U.S. DEIP customer, were decreased 39 percent from 37 million pounds in the third quarter to 22.7 million in the fourth quarter. Third quarter DEIP sales amounted to 53.5 million pounds, or about 33 percent of the total 162.2-million- pound allocation.

IN-AREA DISPOSITION OF FLUID MILK PRODUCTS

Both of the Texas and New Mexico - West Texas orders showed net increases of in-area route disposi-

tions for the period January through September, 1995, compared to a year earlier. The trend toward milk products with lower fat content, a nationwide trend, is apparent in the data for both orders.

Texas

For the first three quarters of 1995, disposition of fluid milk products in the Texas Order totaled 2,342.2 million pounds, up .57 percent compared to the same period in 1994. The increase was due to the relatively strong showing of the lowfat milk products, with the exception of 2 percent milk. All whole milk products showed declines from 1994 levels.

New Mexico - West Texas

For the first three quarters of 1995, disposition of fluid milk products in the New Mexico - West Texas Order totaled 490.5 million pounds, up 2.68 percent compared to the same period in 1994. The increase came from both the whole milk products as well as the lowfat milk products, with the exception of 1% and flavored lowfat milk products.




