

MARKET SUMMARY FOR OCTOBER

The Producer Price Differential (P.P.D.) for milk delivered to handlers located in Dallas/Tarrant counties (TX) of the Southwest Milk Market Order was \$1.45 for October. Butterfat price decreased \$0.7923 per pound from \$2.4449 in September to the level of \$1.6526 for October. Protein price increased \$0.5017 cents per pound from \$2.1647 in September to \$2.6664 in October. October's Other Solids price decreased \$0.038 per pound from the previous month to \$0.1482. The Somatic Cell Count adjustment rate factor for October was .00078 per thousand (difference from 350).

For comparison in hundredweights, producers who delivered milk to handlers located in Dallas/Tarrant counties (TX) received an October statistical uniform price of \$16.05 per hundredweight for milk testing 3.5% butterfat, 2.99% true protein, 5.69% other solids and 350,000 SCC. This is a decrease of \$1.55 in comparison to the statistical blend price of \$17.60 in September.

The October Class I price increased 37 cents from \$18.56 in September to the October level of \$18.93. The Class II price for October of \$13.53 per hundredweight decreased \$2.71 from \$16.24 in September. October's Class III price decreased \$1.30 from \$15.90 in September to \$14.60 in October. The Class IV price decreased \$2.82 from \$15.59 in September to \$12.77 in October.

In October 840 producers delivered a total of 730,263,539 pounds of milk. On a daily basis this represents an increase of 4.84 percent from the producer receipts level in September and it represents an increase of 0.27 percent when compared to the producer receipts level of October 2000.

Producer milk classified as Class I during October amounted to 49.37 percent of total producer receipts. This figure is down from 49.42 percent in September but it is up from 47.53 percent in October 2000. The average butterfat test of producer milk pooled during October was 3.673 percent, average protein test was 3.125 percent, average other solids test was 5.660 percent and the average somatic cell count was 316,000.

LONGTIME SANDIA DAIRYMAN HENRY P. KNOLLE DIES AT 95

Henry P. Knolle born January 3, 1906 in Hondo, Texas, the first son of Almond Henry Knolle and Jennie Pearson Knolle. In 1908, the family moved to Sandia, Texas. Graduating from Alice High School in 1925, he attended Texas A & M University as a member of the class of '29. Henry along with his father and brother, C.E., founded Knolle Jersey farms in 1928 with cattle purchased from the King Ranch, Lasater's and the



Taft Ranch. It grew to be the "World's Largest Jersey Herd" with over 10,000 head of registered Jerseys. In 1943, Knolle Jersey Milk Products began in Corpus Christi, Texas and remained in operation with Henry as president until 1972 when it was merged with Hygeia Dairy Company. From 1972 to 1994 he served as a Director of Hygeia Dairy Company. Henry who had moved to Corpus Christi, Texas in 1955 to over-

see the milk plant operations, returned to Sandia in 1973 where he continued in the production of Jersey milk. During his residence in Corpus Christi, Henry served as President of the Southside Rotary Club, Hilltop Tuberculosis Hospital Board and vice-president of the Corpus Christi Chamber of Commerce. He was on the Board of the American Jersey Cattle Association, vice-president of National All Jersey Inc. and the Texas Jersey Cattle Club where he also served as President. He received the "Distinguished Service Award" and "Master Breeder Award" from the American Jersey Cattle Association in 1967 and 1991 respectively. In 1976, Texas A & M University selected the Knolle Family as Centennial Leaders For Outstanding Contributions to Texas Agriculture During a Century of Change. He was especially proud of his accomplishment in producing an outstanding herd of "polled" Jersey cattle and was honored for this achievement at the San Antonio Livestock Show and Exposition in 1997. He was a member of St. Pius X Mission in Sandia, Texas, the Corpus Christi Town Club.

HYGEIA DAIRY COMPANY CLOSES

After nearly 50 years in operation Hygeia Dairy Company in Corpus Christi, Texas, has closed its milk processing plant. Hygeia milk products will still be available in local supermarkets, although it will be produced and shipped from San Antonio, Texas.

Hygeia's parent company, Suiza Foods Corp., closed the plant November 15. The company was formed in Harlingen, Texas, in 1927 when a group of community leaders hired the late Harvey Lee Richards Sr. to open a dairy to provide pasteurized milk door to door by wagon twice a day. Hygeia built a Harlingen plant in the late 1940s. Hygeia entered the Corpus Christi market in 1954.

USDA RECOMMENDS REVISED CLASS III AND IV PRICE FORMULAS

The U.S. Department of Agriculture issued a recommended decision to amend the current Class III and Class IV pricing formulas under Federal milk orders. The recommendation follows a tentative final decision and interim amendment responding to a Congressional mandate to reconsider the pricing formulas adopted in the final rule for the consolidation and reform of Federal milk orders.

Portions of the interim amendments were enjoined by the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia on Jan. 31, 2001. The earlier actions and this decision were based on testimony and data presented at a public hearing held May 8-12, 2000, to consider proposals submitted by the industry to change the formulas.

The earlier tentative final decision was issued because Congressional deadlines of Dec. 1, 2000, for publication of a final decision and Jan. 1, 2001, for its implementation did not allow enough time to issue a recommended decision and receive and consider comments before issuance of a final decision. The District Court injunction of portions of the earlier amendments requires changes to be made to the tentative final decision consistent with the Court's action.

This decision would leave in place the revised manufacturing allowances for butter, cheese, and nonfat dry milk, but reverse the previous determination that there should be separate butterfat prices for milk used in Class III (cheese) and Class IV (butter and dry milk products). Additional technical modifications are made to the protein price formula. The make allowance for dry whey, one of the factors in calculating Class III value, would be increased from the \$0.140 left in place under the injunction to \$0.159 per pound.

The proposed changes are expected to have little impact on returns to dairy farmers. The recommended decision will be published in the Oct. 25 Federal Register, and interested persons have until Nov. 26 to file comments in response to the recommended decision and the amendments that have been in place under the injunction.




