

#### MARKET SUMMARY FOR OCTOBER

The Producer Price Differential (P.P.D.) for milk delivered to handlers located in Dallas/Tarrant counties (TX) of the Southwest Milk Market Order was \$2.92 for October. Butterfat price decreased \$0.1009 per pound from \$1.5101 in September to the level of \$1.4092 in October. Protein price decreased \$0.2234 per pound from \$4.3929 in September to \$4.1695 in October. October's Other Solids price decreased \$0.0604 per pound from \$0.2890 in September to \$0.2286 in October. The Somatic Cell Count adjustment rate factor for October was 0.00096 per thousand (difference from 350).

For comparison in hundredweights, producers who delivered milk to handlers located in Dallas/Tarrant counties (TX) received an October statistical uniform price of \$21.62 per hundredweight for milk testing 3.5% butterfat, 2.99% true protein, 5.69% other solids and 350,000 SCC. This is a decrease of \$0.81 in comparison to the statistical blend price of \$22.43 in September.

The October Class I price decreased \$0.32 from \$24.91 in September to the October level of \$24.59. The Class II price for October of \$21.90 per hundred-weight decreased \$0.26 from \$22.16 in September. October's Class III price decreased \$1.37 from \$20.07 in September to \$18.70 in October. The Class IV price decreased \$0.30 from \$21.61 in September to \$21.31 in October.

In October 735 producers delivered a total of 837,019,055 pounds of milk. On a daily basis this represents a decrease of 16.19 percent from the producer receipts level in September and it represents a decrease of 8.66 percent when compared to the producer receipts level of October 2006.

Producer milk classified as Class I during October amounted to 43.86 percent of total producer receipts. This figure is up from 34.55 percent in September and it is up from 40.01 percent in October 2006. The average butterfat test of producer milk pooled during October was 3.638 percent, average protein test was 3.109 percent, average other solids test was 5.700 percent and the average somatic cell count was 248,000.

## USDA REOPENS COMMENT PERIOD ON DAIRY PRODUCT REPORTING PROGRAM

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that it is reopening the comment period for the interim final rule for the Dairy Product Mandatory Reporting program The rule was published on July 3rd and became effective Aug. 2nd. The original comment period ended Sept. 4th.

Under this action, additional comments are due Dec. 3, 2007. Comments submitted during the first comment period need not be resubmitted. The reopening of the comment period will provide interested parties with an additional opportunity to submit comments on all aspects of the program. USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) will review and consider all submitted comments as it writes a final rule.

The Dairy Market Enhancement Act of 2000, and certain provisions of the 2002 Farm Bill amended the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946 to establish the program. The mandatory reporting program provides timely, accurate, and reliable market information to facilitate more informed marketing decisions and promote competition in the dairy product manufacturing industry. The program: (1) Requires persons engaged in manufacturing dairy products to report certain information including the price, quantity, and moisture content where applicable, of dairy products sold by the manufacturer; and (2) Requires persons storing dairy products to report information on the quantity of dairy products stored. USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) collects the information. Any manufacturer that processes and markets less than 1 million pounds of dairy products per year is exempt from the reporting requirements.

AMS has implemented a plan to verify the price information submitted to NASS. AMS visits butter, nonfat dry milk, cheese and dry whey manufacturers that file reports. AMS verifies that eligible sales transactions agree with information reported to NASS and will check for eligible sales transactions that were not reported.

Reappointed to serve second terms were: Grant Kohler, Midway, Utah, (Region 3); Jose L. Gonzalez, Mesquite, NM., (Region 4); Paul L. Broering, Saint Henry, Ohio, (Region 9); John M. Larson, Okeechobee, Fla., (Region 10); and Paula A. Meabon, Wattsburg, Pa., (Region 11)

The National Dairy Promotion and Research Board, composed of 36 dairy farmers representing 13 regions of the contiguous United States, administers a coordinated program of promotion, research and nutrition education to increase demand for U.S. produced dairy products.

The board was established by the Dairy Production Stabilization Act of 1983. It is authorized to design programs to strengthen the dairy industry's position in domestic and foreign markets. The national program is financed by a mandatory 15-cent per hundredweight assessment on milk produced in the contiguous 48 states and marketed commercially by dairy farmers. USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service monitors the operation of the board.

AMS encourages all eligible individuals to participate in its committee and board activities. It is USDA's policy that membership on industry-governed boards and committees accurately reflect the diversity of individuals served by the programs.




