March 2023 Federal Order No. 126

Market Overview

Producers who delivered milk to handlers located in Dallas/Tarrant counties (TX) received a February statistical uniform price of \$19.78 for milk testing 3.5% butterfat, 2.99% true protein, 5.69% other solids and 350,000 SCC. This is a decrease in comparison to the statistical uniform price of \$21.12 in January.

The Producer Price Differential (PPD) for milk delivered to handlers located in Dallas/Tarrant counties (TX) of the Southwest Milk Market Order was \$2.00 for February. The February Class I price decreased \$1.63 from \$25.41 in January to the February level of \$23.78. The Class II price decreased \$0.78 from \$21.61 in January to \$20.83 in February. The Class III price decreased \$1.65 from \$19.43 in January to \$17.78 in February. The Class IV price decreased \$1.15 from \$20.01 in January to \$18.86 in February.

In February, 354 producers delivered a total of 1,138,792,251 pounds of milk. On a daily basis, this represents a decrease of 1.56 percent from the producer receipts level in January and an increase of 8.15 percent when compared to the producer receipts level of February 2022.

Producer milk classified as Class I during February amounted to 26.64 percent of total producer receipts. This figure is unchanged from 26.64 percent in January and down from 29.31 percent in February 2022. The average butterfat test of producer milk pooled during February was 4.224 percent, average protein test was 3.393 percent, average other solids test was 5.794 percent, and the average somatic cell count was 211,000.

The February butterfat price decreased \$0.0535 from \$2.7713 in January to the February level of \$2.7178. The protein price increased \$0.4408 from \$2.8058 in January to \$2.3650 in February. The other solids price decreased \$0.0242 from \$0.2343 in January to \$0.2101 in February. The somatic cell adjustment rate in February was 0.00091 per cwt.

February 2023 Pool Summary

- ♦ The Statistical Uniform Price for the Southwest Order in February 2023 is \$21.12 with a PPD of \$2.00
- → 1,139 million pounds were pooled in February. This is down 1.56 percent on a daily basis from January 2023
- ♦ 354 producers pooled their milk; this is down from 367 in January
- → Class I milk accounted for 26.64 percent of all receipts, unchanged from 26.64 in January


Advertised Prices for Dairy Products at Major Retail Supermarket Outlets ending during the period of 3/24/2023 to 3/30/2023

Total conventional dairy advertisements decreased by 10 percent this week, and total organic dairy ads decreased by 12 percent. Ice cream in 48-64 ounce containers was the most advertised dairy product, with a weighted average advertised price of \$3.72, down 23 cents from last week. Gallons of organic milk was the most advertised organic dairy item, with a weighted average advertised price of \$5.37, up 8 cents from last week. Conventional butter in one-pound packages appeared in 175 percent more ads this week, with a weighted average advertised price of \$3.41, down 81 cents from last week.

Total conventional cheese ad numbers decreased 44 percent this week. Shredded cheese in 6-8 ounce packages was the most advertised conventional cheese item this week, with a weighted average advertised price of \$2.76, up 8 cents from last week. Organic 6-8 ounce blocks of cheese was the most advertised organic cheese item this week, with a weighted average advertised price of \$7.34, up 96 cents from last week.


Greek yogurt in 4-6 ounce containers was the most advertised conventional yogurt item, with a weighted average advertised price of \$1.12, up 6 cents from last week. Conventional regular yogurt in 32 ounce containers appeared in 186 percent more ads over last week, with a weighted average advertised price of \$3.16, up 11 cents from the week prior. The most advertised organic yogurt product was regular yogurt in 32 ounce containers, with a weighted average advertised price of \$4.38, down ten cents from the week earlier.

Gallons of conventional milk appeared in 25 percent fewer ads, with a weighted average advertised price of \$3.18, down 30 cents from the week before. As aforementioned, gallons of organic milk had a weighted average advertised price of \$5.37, resulting in an organic premium of \$2.19.




Top 5 Commodities Featured This Week

Percentage of Total Conventional Ads by Commodity




Percentage of Total Organic Ads by Commodity

Texas Dairy Production

In February, Texas dairy production totaled 1,322 million pounds. This is a 5.51 percent increase relative to February 2022 and a 17.1 percent increase from the February five year average (2018-2022). The February average butterfat for Texas production is 4.35 percent, the average protein is 3.44 percent, and the average other solids at 5.80 percent. The average somatic cell count is at 201,000.



Top Texas Counties



New Mexico Dairy Production

In February, New Mexico dairy production totaled 543 million pounds. This is a 3.57 percent decrease relative to February 2022 and a 14.2 percent decrease from the February five year average (2018-2022). The February average butterfat is 4.04 percent, the average protein is 3.32 percent, and the average other solids at 5.79 percent. The average somatic cell count is at 220,000.


