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MARKET SUMMARIES FOR JULY

The July Class III price increased 57 cents from the previous month to \$14.49. The Class II price for July of \$14.07 per hundredweight increased 68 cents from \$13.39 in June. July's Class III-A price increased 89 cents from June's level to \$16.01.

Texas: Producers who delivered milk to handlers located in Zones 1 and 2 of the Texas Milk Market Order received \$15.78 per hundredweight for deliveries of milk containing 3.5% butterfat. The July price was up 75 cents from June.

Producers delivered a total of 515,850,139 pounds of milk during July. On a daily basis this represents a decrease of 10.86 percent from the producer receipts level in June and it represents a decrease of 4.77 percent when compared to the producer receipts level of July 1995.

Producer milk classified as Class I during July amounted to 53.19 percent of total producer receipts. This figure is up from June's 43.60 percent and it is up from 42.62 percent in July 1995. The average butterfat test of producer milk pooled during July 1996 was 3.412 percent.

New Mexico - West Texas: Producers who delivered milk to handlers located in Zone 1 of the New Mexico - West Texas Milk Market Order received \$15.07 per hundredweight for deliveries of milk containing 3.5% butterfat. The July price was up 51 cents from its June level.

Producers delivered a total of 170,613,520 pounds of milk during July. On a daily basis this represents an increase of 14.10 percent from the producer receipts level in June and it represents an increase of 23.90 percent when compared to the producer receipts level of July 1995.

Producer milk classified as Class I during July

amounted to 31.84 percent of total producer receipts. This figure is down from 34.22 percent in June and it is down from 38.67 percent in July 1995. The average butterfat test of producer milk pooled during July 1996 was 3.424 percent.

MilkPEP CAMPAIGN

On March 29, 1996, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that fluid milk processors voted to continue funding Milk*PEP*, a national fluid milk program. Authorization for the Milk*PEP* program is through the Fluid Milk Promotion Act of 1990. Fluid milk processors will be assessed 20 cents per hundredweight on all fluid milk products processed and commercially marketed in consumer-type packages. The assessment applies only to those processors who process and market more than 500,000 pounds per month in the 48 adjoining states and the District of Columbia. In this second phase, funding (expected to be \$100 million per year) will be used to further educate the consumer and promote fluid milk.

Milk mustaches quickly became a status symbol in the first phase, launched February 1995. Prominent female celebrities, models, and sports stars promoted the merits of milk and milk's importance to their lifestyle. After 11 months, a nationwide survey revealed the Milk*PEP* program was successful in meeting its year one objective of positively influencing the target audience's (women ages 25-44) attitudes about milk.

The long-term goal of the program is to stem the decline in fluid milk sales. To reach this goal, the second phase has expanded the target audience to include teen girls and women and men age 18-34. The successful wave of milk mustaches will continue, although the campaigns tag line will change from "Milk. What a surprise!" to "Milk. Where's your mustache?"

GALLO CASE YIELDS CHANGES TO SUIT

After a hearing held July 12, District Court Judge Edward J. Garcia granted the request of Joseph Gallo Farms to enjoin future expenditures of the funds assessed against Gallo Cattle Company based on its milk production. The nations's largest milk producer and a major California cheese manufacturer, Joseph Gallo Farms, Atwater, California, filed a lawsuit in federal court in April.

In the suit, Gallo Farms challenges the right of the State of California and the California Milk Advisory Board (CMAB) to assess a mandatory milk assessment on milk producers. Secretary of the California Department of Food and Agriculture Ann M. Veneman also is named as a defendant in the complaint.

The ruling from the recent hearing requires the Secretary of Agriculture to escrow and hold all assessment funds received from Gallo. These funds total several hundred thousand dollars annually and they are used to support the CMAB's generic advertising and other promotional activities. However, Garcia ruled that Gallo Farms would be required to post a bond of \$10,000 to cover damages.

In addition, CMAB and the State of California have been dismissed from the lawsuit. Because the CMAB is not an independent public entity, the court ruled that the party was not a "proper party to the action and that the state was immune from this action."

USDA TARGETS MARKETS FOR EXPORT OF DAIRY PRODUCTS

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced one-year allocations for the Dairy Export Incentive Program (DEIP) for July 1996 through June 1997.

"These allocations are fully consistent with our Uruguay Round export subsidy reduction commitments and support USDA's continuing efforts in market development by providing exporters additional flexibility in regionalized programming," Glickman said. "While recent program activity has been limited due to market conditions, we will continue to monitor the prices and actions of our competitors, and fully intend to use the DEIP as appropriate."

Export sales under DEIP are facilitated through the payment of bonuses by the USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC). Sales of nonfat dry milk, whole milk powder, butterfat, and cheddar, Feta, Gouda, cream, mozzarella and process American cheeses are made through normal commercial channels at competitive world prices.

DEIP allocations are available for sale to 112 countries totaling 100,222 metric tons of nonfat dry milk; 97 countries totaling 9,971 metric tons of whole milk powder; 111 countries totaling 38,611 metric tons of butterfat; and 109 countries totaling 3,669 metric tons of cheddar, Feta, Gouda, cream, mozzarella and processed American cheeses.

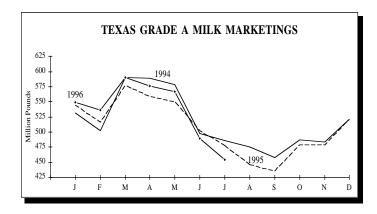

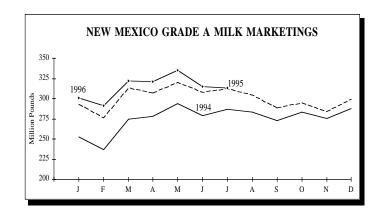
